## Remount Station Memorial Bench Vandalised

Many local people will know the history of the Daisy Field, just off the Portway in Shirehampton, was once a Remount Station where horses were trained and then shipped out via Avonmouth Docks to the battle front during WWI. It is now a significant part of Shirehampton's History.





During November and December 2013 a collaboration between LinkAge, Oasis Academy Lawrence Weston and Alistair Park, a professional Wood Carver, made a special bench with carvings etched into the wood that would be a lasting memorial to the Remount Station. It was an intergenerational project with local students, local people aged over 50 years, LinkAge and Alistair Park who oversaw the project. He put the bench together so it could be installed in the Orchard area of the Daisy Field during 2014. I was lucky enough to be asked to photo-diarise the project.

As you can see from the photos a lot of work had gone into the bench with the carvings being made. My mum was one of the people who helped with the project along with several of her friends. **Dick Helme**, the local Wood Turner who took part in the **Craft Exhibition** each year was also prolific in the project. The local students were fascinated with his work and advice he gave them. Both have since passed on but for me I was able to say 'my mum helped make this.'



Fast forward to **September 2024** and having had a few incidents reported that two or three youngsters had tried to set fire to the bench and destroy it, only intervention from the public had stopped them on several occasions.

Friends of Lamplighters Marsh are the custodians of Lamplighters Marsh and the Daisy Field, had kept a close eye on this along with additional community people, but on Friday 13th September John Hastings a member of FoLM made the heart breaking discovery that the bench was vandalised during the previous night. He posted his photo on the FoLM Facebook page saying "Here's a photo of the damage done to our lovely bench in the Daisy Field. Hopefully we can get it repaired fully, but, nonetheless, it's extremely heart breaking"

Outrage had spread across social media with many saying that this shows great disrespect. "Countless hours of work to make this and minutes to destroy" said **Sharon Davies** whilst **Pamela** said "The parents of these vandals should be ashamed. My Great Grandad was based in Shirehampton in WW1 looking after the horses. I just can't understand this mindless vandalism that is a plague and a stain on society."



Offers of help have also been made to fix the bench to which FoLM and the local community are thankful for this. It certainly puts faith back into community togetherness no matter where you live.


Alistair Park was informed of the travesty as he was part of the team that helped put together and installed this bench into the Daisy Field. He remembers the project well and will be helping with repairs

John Hastings from FoLM has given an update. "We met with Alistair Park, who created the bench, and he was amazed how well it had been looked after over the last 12 years, which is a testament to the local community ownership. We have applied for a grant to cover the cost of repair and the bench will be back in place before very long."

### Happy Days Memory Café is Full of Activity

The Bristol Dementia Action Alliance has been busy making Shirehampton the first dementia aware village in Bristol. They are spreading their wings to other areas of North Bristol with similar plans.

Living with dementia or awaiting a diagnosis is not easy, in fact it can be quite scary with the fear of the unknown not only for the person concerned but their loved ones as well.

The Bristol Dementia Action Alliance (BDAA) is the one stop shop for anyone needing advice and the organisation can provide plenty of information for you and who to contact. But the BDAA also organise regular activities for people living with dementia, even those struggling with memory loss and their carers.

They have Happy Days Memory Cafés in Shirehampton, Avonmouth, Sea Mills and Westbury-On-Trym and I decided to find out more about the Shirehampton monthly event that is held at the Cotswold Community Centre, Dursley Road.



Being August some people were away on holiday but there were still people attending and ready to have a go at willow weaving. **Guy from Alive! Activities** had brought along everything you needed to make a small willow fence that you could use as a garden border. Willow weaving is quite repetitive and relaxing. I think everyone is having a brilliant time and that is important. It makes people feel that they are still engaged with life, still doing things that they enjoy doing and the social side is also massive," said Guy.

I am observing everyone in the room. Three groups of people, some living with dementia, their carers and some volunteers. The camaraderie is impressive and everyone is chatting and enjoying themselves. The progress of willow weaving is creative and needs some concentration although you wouldn't think it due to the fast progress they are making.

Lisa Dicker is the Community Development Manager for Bristol Dementia Action Alliance. She said "We like to do different things to keep people stimulated and today Guy has come along to do some willow weaving. There's been no injuries as yet, just a few pokes on the head but everyone seems to be enjoying themselves and being kept busy. The other week we had mini Olympics in Avonmouth, people really enjoyed it and it was simple things like cups with ping pong balls. It's just getting people moving and having a bit of fun. It also helps with



co-ordination as dementia can have an effect on this. One of the favourite activities was with owls. We had a lovely organisation come in bringing owls along with them. It was wonderful because people that don't normally engage very well lit up, they came to life and they were holding the owls when I didn't think they would. But everybody likes something different. Sometimes we have singers in, some people love to join in and sing and reminisce sessions too".

With all the Happy Days Memory Cafés refreshments and biscuits are served and each is run from 2pm until 4pm. The one in Shirehampton takes place the third Friday of each month at the Cotswold Community Centre, Dursley Road, BS11 9XH. Avonmouth is the second Tuesday of the month at Avonmouth Community Centre, 257 Avonmouth Road, BS11 9EN. Sea Mills is the last Thursday of the month at Sea Mills Methodist Church, 140 Shirehampton Road, BS9 2DY.

## An Update from Darren Jones MP, Bristol North West

Bristol North West is home to several historic villages, but none are closer to my heart than my home area of Shire.

I'm therefore saddened that my office has been contacted by many Shire residents of late who are concerned about persistent antisocial behaviour in our village. It's deeply troubling to hear constituents say they feel unsafe and intimidated by groups of young people on our streets.

We've had reports of garden gates being kicked in, windows broken, and vandalism of retail units and community facilities.

A particular menace of late seems to be people driving loud electric 'scrambler' bikes – high-speed dirt bikes that are designed for off-road riding. However, these are reportedly being driven at high speeds in pedestrianised areas, causing alarm and safety concerns, as well as on our green spaces where they could harm flora and fauna.

Constituents who have written to me have shared their dismay that **Police Community Support Officers (PCSOs)** have said they have no powers to stop these electric scrambler bikes.

In response to these queries, I've been in touch with my colleague **Dame Diana Johnson MP**, who is the **Minister for Policing, Fire and Crime Prevention**, to discuss how the government will be implementing measures to tackle antisocial behaviour and increase the role of community policing. I have also raised the issue with our local **Police and Crime Commissioner** and **Leader of** 

**the Council** to understand what more can be done locally to not only punish bad behaviour but redirect energy to better pursuits.

Staying on the topic of law and order, I was pleased to have the opportunity recently to meet some of the **officers from Bristol North West** who policed the recent violent disorder in the city centre.

My visit to thank the brave officers who restored peace and order to our streets was arranged for 21st September, to mark the International Day of Peace.

During my visit, Superintendent Mark Runacres, Chief Inspector Vicks Hayward-Melen and Avon and Somerset Police and Crime Commissioner Clare Moody also gave me a briefing on how they are tackling knife crime in Bristol.

Hopefully, a recent change in the law that means it is now a criminal offence to possess a zombie-style knife or machete will help to get these weapons off our streets. This law came into effect on **24th September**.

Zombie-style knives and machetes have been added to the list of prohibited offensive weapons under the **Criminal Justice Act 1988**, along with a ban on their manufacture, importation, sale, and supply.

And finally, I would like to invite you to a special event that I'm holding on the afternoon of **Saturday**, **9th November**.



Rachel Reeves, the Chancellor of the Exchequer – and my boss! – will deliver her Budget at the end of October. To answer any questions that my constituents have once the Budget has been announced, I'll be holding a Budget Town Hall the following week. I've chosen a central venue for this event, near Westbury-on-Trym, so that it is accessible to constituents from across Bristol North West.



### **Shire Primary School News**

Term 1 week 5 has been the Science/Technology/Engineering/Mathematics (STEM) week at SPS. All week, children throughout the school have been learning about STEM by exploring and investigating a variety of topics covering these subject areas. We have had lots of fantastic visitors and experiences, including: Badminton School (with a 'Liquid Nitrogen' show), The University of the West of England (UWE) Engineering (exploring using Minecraft), Wessex Water Education, Avon Gorge and Wildlife ('Autumn Antics').

Almost all of the external activities were **very kindly provided free of charge** by the various providers, and this sort of experience would simply not be possible without their generosity, and we would like to thank them for this. We also made very good use of the lovely school minibuses!

A particular highlight were the two visits by Y6 to **Nisbets Limited** (the leading catering equipment supplier in the UK) at their main site in Avonmouth. The children (and staff) were provided with a fascinating insight into this amazing local success

story (which is now 41 years old and has become one of the largest employers in the area). Nisbets were incredibly generous with both with their time and resources. There was a food-based quiz (with prizes), a tour of the premises and a breakfast/brunch (including a slushy!). We discovered that there are strong links with the school with some parents work there and some older siblings (now at **Oasis**) having completed work experience there. The children were really engaged and several of them have said that they are now thinking of a career in catering!



The Bristol area has a long and proud history in STEM and the children certainly seem very keen to continue this tradition. They now realise that STEM can provide fantastic opportunities for them in the future, especially with Shirehampton being so well located for some major employers. Most of all, they understand that STEM can really be fun!

## Oasis Alcohol Awareness Event

On Tuesday afternoon, 150 year 8 pupils at Oasis Academy Brightstowe received a powerful lesson on the dangers of underage drinking from the alcohol awareness theatre production Smashed. Combining live theatre performance with interactive workshops, Smashed helps young people understand the causes and consequences of underage drinking by encouraging pupils to reflect on the themes and answer questions about the choices made by the characters.

The performance at **Oasis Academy** was the final show of **Smashed**'s most recent tour of 12 schools across Bristol this September. Over the past ten days, Smashed has performed for **over 2,300 pupils in Bristol** and the surrounding area, helping to transform attitudes and encourage meaningful behaviour change around alcohol consumption among young people.

Commenting on Tuesday's performance, a teacher at Oasis Academy, said: "We were lucky enough to have Smashed Live do a performance for our year 8s. Our year 8s really enjoyed it; they were really engaged and they learnt loads about the effects of alcohol in a really engaging way".

This year, Smashed is celebrating its **20th anniversary** and has to date helped educate over 580,000 students in Great Britain and 5.5 million young people globally in an effort to reduce underage drinking across the world.

The UK has made encouraging progress in reducing levels of underage drinking in the past decade. However, there is still more to be done to drive down the rate of underage drinking across the country. In Bristol, hospital admissions for alcohol-specific conditions among under 18s remain above England's national average.

## **Extraordinary Links**

Who are Extraordinary Links and what they do?

Extraordinary Links started out just before the Covid Pandemic took hold that then led to lockdown. They had only had one event before 'closing' and decided to go online to continue with their work. They provide regular activities for *children with Special Education Needs*, with support and information also provided to parents and carers.

Gill Cray is the person who runs Extraordinary Links in Shirehampton: "We do an activity every week for the children. This is a planned activity and it can be anything from science to cooking to art. At our group we have our Minecraft group for kids who are really into Minecraft and it helps promote social communication and development".

Gill is very dedicated and helps where she can. "Our children have additional needs or special educational needs. They come here and they find people that are very similar to them and this helps promote social skills. The parents come along too and they find friendship as well as realising that we are all in the same boat. It can be very isolating having a child with special education needs and this group makes sure that you know that you are not alone, other people have gone through the same thing and we can help each other out."

"We can offer advice and sign posting to organisations that can provide more help or information. With parents, I also help them with Educational Health Care Plans and Disability Living Allowance forms as they can be very tricky to complete especially if you are not used to filling them out. I personally also help with advocacy for parents so I can go along with them for meetings at schools and help them that way to make sure their children get the best outcomes for them."

"It is a safe place for all and you don't have to come every week. A child may decide they don't want to be here one week and we do have flexibility. Parents have to stay throughout the sessions and its free too. **SCOPE** have actually said it costs £900 extra a month if you have a disabled family member in your home so we don't want to add to that stress."

The hall is buzzing with activity. There is plenty of chat and involvement with parents and children alike. It feels a happy place to be, allowing children to be children. They were making pancake pizza's and filling them with fruits and chocolate. A fun thing to do and the children were being creative too.

I asked mum, **Sarah** why she brings her children here: "I have four children, two of which are autistic. We come here to meet with other families that totally understand that some days are low and some days are high but here that's ok. We can be just ourselves here with no judgement. You don't feel any pressure. My daughter enjoys arts and crafts and my son likes to run wild as you see."

I just see a young boy running around enjoying play and the freedom to do so. Isn't that part of childhood? It was part of mine.

**Kirsty** is another mum who has three children with two at school age: "The kids love it and it's free flow play where they can join in, they can choose to do other activities with other children or be on their own. At the moment they enjoy Minecraft, but its lots of fun to be here. For me it's relaxed, easy and I feel supported".

Extraordinary Links is funded by various organisations which means no charge is made. It's free to attend. One hour sessions take place every Wednesday from 4pm until 5pm at the Public Hall, Station Road, Shirehampton, Bristol, BS11 9TX and during termtime only.

## Climate Repair Nature Nites Café is Back

At the heart of our repair café are three very capable and experienced sewing machinists Rebecca, Gail and Juliet. Between them they deal with whatever is brought to them on the day.

As Juliet recalls: 'The **sewing repair service** was in great demand at this event with a steady stream of visitors arriving throughout the morning, clutching various items hoping that one of the team would be free to help. Fortunately, no one had to wait for long. During the morning, I was able to fix someone's favourite pair of exercise leggings, alter the length of a pair of pyjama bottoms, shorten and reshape the sleeves on a lady's top, and create a new backing for a much-loved fold up chair. To this already impressive list Rebecca was able to add the repair of two leather gloves, two fencing jackets, a rucksack and an outdoor jacket' That makes for a good many happy visitors!



There were other things going on in the space. We brought in garments to swap or give away. Bike repair tools were on hand. Georgie brought with her a pop-up library with very interesting books on foraging and guides for greener ways of living. Annelies demonstrated dyeing with onion skins - and upcycled an old summer jacket in the process.



Dyeing fibres naturally with plants is labour intensive and rather 'niche'; something textile artists or artisans might do. However, onion skins are something we can all accumulate; it is worth knowing that they can be turned into an effective non-toxic dye, suitable for all natural fibres.

On offer were also delicious cakes and biscuits served up with a warming cup of tea or coffee. Information on how to stay warm over the coming months was made available by Theresa from the Bristol Energy Network.

People are asking if we are planning to arrange for other kinds of repairs: electrical, wood, ceramic. We hope the Café will grow and eventually be able to offer more types of repair services. In the meantime, you can be sure to have a stimulating and sociable time at our next event on January 18th, 2025.

The Repair Café is organised by the Shirehampton Climate Emergency Group. We are planning to offer a 'Talking Space' as part of our future cafés, for questions and concerns about the changing climate.








## **Robert Stephens – From Shirehampton to the Royal National Theatre and the Big Screen**

On 27 September 2024 our country lost one of its finest actresses and a "national treasure" when sadly *Dame Maggie Smith* passed away. For over seven decades she entertained us in memorable film and TV parts with her wit in comedic and dramatic roles.



I was sparked to write this article because little is known today about her first husband, **Robert Stephens**, to whom she was married to for eight years from 1967 to 1975.

One day, whilst walking down **Priory Road**, I spotted a blue plaque outside one of the houses and I was curious to see what famous person had lived there. It said "Sir Robert Stephens (1931 – 1995) – Early star of the National Theatre, London. Stage and screen actor. Lived here from 1931 to 1939."

I was curious to learn a bit more about this actor from Shirehampton and was fascinated to read about his illustrious career.

He was from very humble beginnings. His father was a shipyard labourer and his mother worked at the chocolate factory. At the age of 18, Stephens won a scholarship to drama school and his career blossomed thereafter. He was amongst the first ensemble of great British actors at the Royal National Theatre and worked alongside such greats as Michael Gambon, Derek Jacobi, Lynn and Michael Redgrave and with his future wife, Maggie Smith.

Stephens had roles in some classic films such as *Cleopatra* with **Elizabeth Taylor**, and he starred alongside **Rita Tushingham** in the cult film *A Taste of Honey* (1961), with Maggie Smith (his then wife) in *The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie* (1969) and **Billy Wilder**'s *The Private Life of Sherlock Holmes* (1970).

Following the demise of Maggie Smith, I recently watched the superb film, The Prime of Miss Jean Brodie, for which she won her first **Oscar** as the liberal-minded and unrestrained teacher in a girls' school. Stephens plays the sophisticated and handsome (and married) art teacher to whom Miss Brodie is madly in love with, and he with her, and the chemistry between them on screen is palpable.




Sadly in 1970, following Stephens' departure from the National Theatre and the break-up of his marriage to Maggie Smith in 1973, he suffered a career slump - not helped by heaving drinking and a breakdown. However in the 1990s he re-established himself at the forefront of his profession when the Royal Shakespeare Company invited him to play some leading roles and in 1993 he won the Laurence Oliver Theatre Award for Best Actor for his performance as Falstaff in Henry IV.

Stephens was knighted in 1995 for his "Services to **Drama**" but 11 months after his knighthood he died at the age of 64 due to complications during surgery.

It's amazing that only a few streets away from where I live was born an actor who went on to achieve a wonderful stage and film career and marry one of the country's finest and most loved actresses, Dame Maggie Smith.

Isla, of Ashley Down, also began at u7's and also plays in the back line, at centre. She too values the close friendships that are forged by playing together. Our headline is a quote from Isla's cheeky brother Jacob, as she smiled for the camera. It's a good illustration of the great family atmosphere that permeated the air as the girls readied themselves for the match.

The result of the match was secondary to the efforts of the two clubs to give these girls the opportunity to compete in the sport that they love. Imperial's experience as a team showed, running in early tries but our girls never gave up, playing for their team with the passion and commitment that had been described by Milly and Isla. **Phoebe** ran in two tries for Avonmouth and **Molly R** converted one of them; they will only improve as a team, as they play together more.

Jake Watts, a 4th Dan Black Belt in karate and kickboxing, is open about his reasons for taking up martial arts; he had experienced bullying throughout his school days and young adult life, suffering an assault at work. So, seventeen years ago, he "decided to take control of his life" and took up martial arts. As he progressed through the grades, he jumped at the opportunity to train as an instructor, going on to launch the Victory Martial Arts Academy, starting at the PBA club; following the COVID pandemic, the academy continued to grow and Jake moved into his own premises four years ago, in the High Street.



When Shire visited the VMA dojo, Sensei Jake was addressing a group about to go through grading assessments, a test of physical and mental prowess, allowing students to move up a grade and get their new coloured belts. What was immediately obvious was the discipline, poise, dignity and focus that each and every member of the group showed. It was truly impressive. Jake told the group, that he was not there to fail them. If they didn't get it right first time they had to "try, try and try again" until they did. Jake's philosophy is "A Black Belt is just a White Belt who never gave up!", a powerful message for the children.

Jake told us that two of the achievements he is most proud of are:

In a previous school, taking 20+ students to the world championships in Portugal, with 15 winning gold medals in their respective divisions.

Being told by students of his academy that they are **now confident in standing up to bullying** at school, thanks to the skills and confidence they've developed through his classes.

He then said that as long as a student leaves the dojo feeling fulfilled, that's his greatest accomplishment.

**Jake's future aspirations?** He hopes to move to bigger premises, accommodating more students as numbers grow and maybe even take students from his academy to an international tournament.

His basic aspiration though remains to continue to help students to feel the way that he felt himself when he left his first class with his instructor **Dylan**, so many years ago.

Photos were taken of the warm-up, but it did not seem right to linger for the assessments. As these remarkable young people began to work for their gradings, they deserved an environment in which they could concentrate wholly on the development of **Mind, Body and Spirit**.

## Thinking, Feeling & Knowing

In fencing, as in any other sport, there are those annoying characters who are just good at it. They don't know how or why; they just are. There's one consolation for the rest of us; that they'll never be as good as they should be if they stop at that.

Truly to master and fully enjoy a sport requires that we know, feel and understand; using all three effects of experience to some the problem before us.

There's always the element of skill. Some lucky dogs have it, it seems inherently. How could we ever gain it? Think how you learned to ride a bicycle. It wasn't explained to you in detail; in my case, as in many others, someone I trusted told me to peddle away and that they'd be holding securely to the saddle. At some point, they let go; I didn't notice until I was peddling, happily away and was riding and could ride the bicycle. That's how skill works; we trick the monkey part of our brain into solving the problem for us. We never know how it does it.

Fencing is both more complex and more forgiving than riding a bicycle; I can ride a bicycle or I can't. If I can't I fall over. There's one, basic way to solve the problem for our monkey brain. It's possible to deliver a hit or stop one in many ways and that

monkey brain can conjure any one of them at random. Think of it as the difference between chess and snakes and ladders. There's only one way to solve the problem of playing the latter game but although I might have many moves I could make, not all of them are equally useful.

To make sure I learn the right skill, my coach has to understand what the right one is and how to trick me into it. As my opponent is trying to thwart my skill, I have to understand how they are doing it and what counters I have to their intentions in pursuing my own. I have to be my own coach in the fight and that needs an understanding.

Where does feeling come in? It's what allows us to judge when there's no time to review or analyse. It has to be corrected and informed by both but in the moment, we feel what the distance is we should be at; feel when an opportunity is a trap and feel when are controlling and compelling the reactions of our opponent.


